<p>Show awareness of how <u>story in First Peoples' cultures</u> connects people to family and community</p> <p>:traditional and contemporary First Peoples' stories take many forms (e.g., prose, song, dance, poetry, theatre, carvings, pictures) and are told for several purposes: -teaching (e.g., life lessons, community responsibilities, rites of passage) -sharing creation stories -recording personal, family, and community histories -"mapping" the geography and resources of an area -ensuring cultural continuity (e.g. knowledge of ancestors, language) -healing -entertainment</p>	<p><u>Exchange ideas and perspectives</u> to build shared understanding</p> <p>:involves taking turns in offering ideas related to the topic at hand, focusing on the speaker without interrupting, and generally contributing to the discussion</p>	<p>Identify, organize, and present ideas in a variety of forms</p>	<p>Create <u>stories</u> and other <u>texts</u> to deepen awareness of self, family, and community</p>

<p>Plan and create a variety of communication forms for different purposes and audiences</p> <p>:examples include lists, journals, notes, simple stories, digital presentations, oral presentations, pictures, and drama (e.g., puppet shows, dance, plays, storyboards) used to communicate ideas and information</p>	<p>Communicate using letters and words and applying some conventions of Canadian spelling, grammar, and punctuation</p> <p>:common practices in writing, such as correct use of capitals and small letters printed legibly; familiar words spelled correctly; and correct use of periods, question marks, and capitals (including capitalized <i>I</i>); introduction to Canadian spelling</p>	<p>Explore oral storytelling processes</p> <p>:creating an original story or finding an existing story (with permission), sharing the story from memory with others, using vocal expression to clarify the meaning of the text</p>	<p>elements of story setting, character, events (few details)</p>
<p>literary elements and devices</p> <p>poetic language, figurative language, sound play, images, colour, symbols</p>	<p>vocabulary to talk about texts</p> <p>book, page, chapter, author, title, illustrator, pictures, web page, website and search box</p>	<p>reading strategies</p> <p>using illustrations and prior knowledge to predict meaning; rereading; retelling in own words; locating the main idea and details; using knowledge of language patterns and phonics to decode words; identifying familiar and "sight" words; monitoring (asking: Does it look right? Sound right? Make sense?); self-correcting errors consistently using three cueing systems: meaning, structure, and visual</p>	<p>oral language strategies</p> <p>adjusting volume, pace, tone, and articulation; focusing on the speaker; taking turns; asking questions related to the topic; making personal connections; and making relevant contributions to discussion</p>
<p>metacognitive strategies</p> <p>talking and thinking about learning (e.g., through reflecting, questioning, goal setting, self-evaluating) to develop awareness of self as a reader and as a writer</p>	<p>writing processes</p> <p>may include revising, editing, considering audience</p>	<p>letter formation</p> <p>legible printing with spacing between letters and words</p>	<p>sentence structure</p> <p>the structure of simple sentences</p>

<p>phonemic and phonological awareness</p> <p><i>phonological</i> refers to the sounds of words (as opposed to their meanings)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • phonemic awareness is a specific aspect of a learner's phonological awareness: a child's ability to segment spoken words into phonemes (e.g., c/a/t) and to blend phonemes into words indicates a developing phonemic awareness • phonological awareness involves the abilities to hear and create rhyming words, segment the flow of speech into separate words, and hear syllables as "chunks" in spoken words 	<p>conventions</p> <p>common practices in punctuation (e.g., the use of a period or question mark at the end of sentence) and in capitalization (e.g. capitalizing the first letter of the first word at the start of a sentence, people's names, and the pronoun <i>I</i>)</p>	<p>concepts of print</p> <p>the conventional features of written English, such as:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • the symbolic nature of writing • the correspondence of spoken words to printed words (one-to-one matching) • the association of letters and sounds • the distinct features of letters and words • the correspondence between uppercase and lowercase letters • left-to-right directionality • the use of space to mark word boundaries • the use of specific signs and symbols for punctuation (e.g., period, exclamation point, question mark) 	<p>print awareness</p> <p>understanding of the nature and uses of print, including letters and print symbols; children's print awareness is closely associated with their word awareness (the ability to recognize words as distinct elements of oral and written communication) and is an important precursor to literacy development and early reading achievement</p>

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
